Expanding Access

Welcome to the latest issue of Niu Waves, from the IPPF Sub-Regional Office for the Pacific. The data is in and we are thrilled to report that the eight Partnerships for Health MAs delivered 137% more services in the first six months of 2019 compared to the first half of 2018. We saw 74% more first time visitors to our clinics and provided contraception to 67% more first time users. 90% of our SRH services were provided to poor or vulnerable clients. PNGFHA has also delivered an increase in services year on year, but due to delays in data collection, we can only report on PNGFHA's annual data currently.

These outstanding results are testament to the hard work and dedication of every volunteer, board member, executive director and member of staff across the Pacific MAs and the SROP office and the improvements that have been made in data management, service delivery and awareness raising in recent years. We look forward to building on our successes in the second half of 2019 and into 2020, ensuring that people in the Pacific are empowered to fulfill their SRHR.

SROP and the Pacific MAs also marked two key International Days in August: International Youth Day on 12th and World Humanitarian Day on 19th. Young people are crucial to the work of IPPF and International Youth Day provides a chance for us to celebrate their contributions. On World Humanitarian Day, we celebrated all those working to maintain access to SRH services for people in the Pacific, even during humanitarian crises, particularly Women Humanitarians, who were the theme of the celebration this year.

Service Delivery January - June 2019


SROP is delighted to share the service statistics from the first half of 2019 from Cook Islands, Fiji, Kiribati, Samoa, Solomon Islands, Tonga, Tuvalu and Vanuatu. Due to technical issues causing delays in data collection, we are only able to report on annual data for Papua New Guinea Family Health Association (PNGFHA).

Comparing the first half of 2019 to the same period in 2018, there has been a 137% increase in services delivered by the 8 Partnerships for Health MAs. The MAs provided a staggering 107,000 services in just 6 months, 62,000 of which were SRH services. Of the SRH services, 56,000 were provided to vulnerable or marginalised clients. We provided services to twice as many young people in the first six months of 2019 than 2018 and to 68% more women.

There were almost 6,000 first time users of contraception, an increase of 67% year on year. Over 10,000 clients visited MA clinics for the first time in the first half of 2019, a 74% increase from 2018.

Sera, SROP M&E Officer, has been working closely with PNGFHA this year to improve their data management systems. However, due to the challenges of collecting data from remote clinics without reliable internet service, we have not been able to collect service statistics for the full first six months of 2019 yet.

Analysing PNGFHA's annual performance over the last three years, however, we see an encouraging trend, with SRH services increasing, particularly among young people. In 2018, PNGFHA delivered over 85,000 SRH services to young people, a 34% increase year on year, and provided over 4,300 Couple Years of Protection, a 29% increase on 2017.







RFHAF - Future She Deserves

On 23rd August, Reproductive and Family Health Association of Fiji (RFHAF) marked the culmination of the Future She Deserves Program with an awards ceremony to celebrate the achievements of the young women who participated.

Funded by the Fiji Women's Fund, the Future She Deserves program targets adolescent girls to empower them to make decisions about their sexual and reproductive health. This is achieved through SRH awareness raising and mentoring to assist participants develop their skills in decision making, communication and assertiveness.

CIFWA - Engaging Parliamentarians

The Cook Islands Family Welfare Association (CIFWA) hosted an information session with female parliamentarians and their partners, to increase awareness of SRHR issues and celebrate the recent increase in the representation of women in parliament. Rongo File, CIFWA Executive Director and Polly Tongia, CIFWA Program Manager, shared their experiences of delivering sexual and reproductive health programs and championing gender equality in Cook Islands.

International Youth Day

12th August marked International Youth Day, which was celebrated around the world. Young people are integral to the work of IPPF and the Pacific MAs took the opportunity to thank their passionate youth volunteers for the work they do to advance SRHR across the Pacific. Volunteers at the MAs were also keen to give back further to their communities and peers: volunteers at SFHA spent the day with residents at Mapuifagalele at Vailele Aged Care Facility and volunteers at Solomon Islands Planned Parenthood Association (SIPPA) set up a youth stall during the International Youth Day celebrations to raise awareness of SRHR issues.

IPPF Youth Manifesto

IPPF also launched the consultation process for the Youth Manifesto on International Youth Day. This is an opportunity for young people around the world to tell the world what they want and need from sexual and reproductive health services.

WHO Updated Contraception Guidance

Following the recent study which found no links between HIV risk and contraceptive method used, the World Health Organization (WHO) has released updated guidance statement on contraceptive eligibility for women at high risk of HIV. programming for women and girls with disabilities, with a particular focus on programs which support the procurement, storage and distribution of Dignity Kits. To progress this work and ensure that humanitarian response is more inclusive of the needs of women and girls with disabilities, a workshop on adapting Dignity Kits and related programming to suit the needs of those with disabilities will take place in Nadi from $10^{\rm th}-12^{\rm th}$ September with MAs and the Pacific Humanitarian team, PDF and Disabled Peoples Organisations and UNFPA representatives from Solomon Islands, Vanuatu, Samoa, Kiribati, Fiji, and Tonga.
