# Social Enterprise Internship

The Global Social Enterprise Internship, hosted by the Social Enterprise Hub in Sri Lanka, began on 14th October. The 4-week program brings together MAs from 8 countries, including from Tamoa Moanatta from Kiribati Family Health Association (KFHA), to build their capacity to undertake social entrepreneurship activities. The program covers a broad range of topics and skills building activities to support delegates to be the social enterprise focal point when they return to their MA. We look forward to supporting Tamoa to share her knowledge when she returns.



From 8<sup>th</sup> to 10<sup>th</sup> October, SPC hosted a Regional Young Leaders Dialogue on Good Governance and Human Rights in Nadi, bringing together young people from 18 Pacific Island Countries. Jack Martin, SROP Youth and CSE Officer, and Monica Burns, Humanitarian SRH Services Advisor, delivered engaging sessions on how youth participation in governance can be strengthened both in development and humanitarian settings. Meaningful youth engagement is crucial to fulfilling IPPF's mandate and Jack also provided an update on the ongoing development of the IPPF Youth Manifesto.



## RFHAF Open Day

On 26th October, the Reproductive and Family Health Association of Fiji (RFHAF) hosted an open day to commemorate Pinktober, a month to raise awareness of breast and other cancers, including cervical cancers. As part of the open day, RFHAF offered free screenings for cervical cancer, which is a major cause of mortality in Fiji and other Pacific Islands.

The open day was well attended, with lots of young people and was a great opportunity for RFHAF to raise awareness of the other services they offer in addition to cancer screening, including contraception.





## SROP Welcomes Tomoko!

From 14<sup>th</sup> to 16<sup>th</sup> October, the SROP office was thrilled to host Tomoko Fukuda, ESEAOR Regional Director, to the Pacific for the first time. Tomoko met with the SROP Humanitarian and Development teams to discuss priorities and actions for the coming year.

# Data Utilisation Workshop

From 14th to 18th October, Sera Vulavou, SROP M&E Officer, and Adam Konrote, Data and Advocacy Officer at RFHAF, attended the Data Utilisation Strategy workshop in Cambodia. The workshop brought together Data and M&E Officers from MAs and Regional Offices around the region and was facilitated by the Organisational Learning team from Central Office.

The workshop focused on how we use data in decision making, the basics of data visualisation and how to promote the use of data in your organisation, as well as seeking to develop best practices for the use of data within IPPF more generally.

Following Sera and the team's work to revolutionise the data collection and management tools in the Pacific, we are now collecting a wealth of quality data which can greatly inform and improve the services we offer. ### **SIPPA Fundraising Dinner**

Solomon Islands Planned Parenthood Association (SIPPA) hosted their first fundraising dinner in October to celebrate the expansion of their cervical cancer screening program. The evening included a speech from Ben Angoa, SIPPA Executive Director, on the importance of cervical cancer screening, and a drama put on by SIPPA staff and volunteers. Ben highlighted that cervical cancer is the third highest cause of mortality in Solomon Islands and called on government and the private sector to do more to support prevention and early screening.

### **UNFPA IP Meeting**

From 22<sup>nd</sup> to 24<sup>th</sup> October, Karen Hill, Director of Programs and Operations, Pacific, and Robyn Drysdale, Humanitarian Deputy Director, Pacific, attended UNFPA's kick-off workshop ahead of the implementation of the Transformative Agenda, which will begin in 2020. The workshop brought together all the Implementing Partners (IPs) as well as the UNFPA team, including the country offices, and national government representatives. As the Transformative Agenda will be implemented across six countries, it was crucial to understand the differing needs and priorities of each country and to iron out what support each IP needed to achieve their part of the program.

## SRHR & People with Disabilities

From 7<sup>th</sup> to 9<sup>th</sup> October, representatives from SROP, Tonga Family Health Association (TFHA), Samoa Family Health Association (SFHA), and RFHAF attended the Women and Young People with Disabilities: Guidelines for Providing Rights-Based and Gender-Responsive Services to Address Gender-Based Violence and Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights workshop, hosted by UNFPA and Women Enabled International. The workshop focused on developing guidelines to support SGBV and SRHR programming for people living with disability and the MAs and SROP were represented on two panels.

## Comprehensive Abortion Care

From 21<sup>st</sup> to 24<sup>th</sup> October, Tarai Nakolinivalu, SROP Quality of Care Officer, and Monica Burns, Humanitarian SRH Services Advisor, represented the Pacific at the Comprehensive Abortion Care in Humanitarian Settings training in Bangkok. Hosted by the Humanitarian Hub in collaboration with South Asia Regional Office, Global Comprehensive Abortion Care Initiative project and IPAS, the training focused on the importance of preparedness and comprehensive abortion care, particularly in humanitarian settings. Participants attended from seven countries.

#### SGBV Fundamentals Training in Vanuatu

Petra Letter, Gender Specialist, and Tura Lewai, SROP Advocacy Officer, travelled to Vanuatu from 14<sup>th</sup> to 18<sup>th</sup> October to jointly deliver the Sexual and Gender-Based Violence (SGBV) Fundamentals training for Vanuatu Family Health Association (VHFA) staff, volunteers and selected partners.



The training focuses on building the capacity of staff and partners to provide first-line support to survivors of SGBV and to establish efficient and effective referral mechanisms to enable survivor-centred care.

#### Asia Humanitarian Meeting

Sala Tupou, Humanitarian Program Manager, joined the Humanitarian Hub in Bangkok for the annual Asia Humanitarian Meeting from 14<sup>th</sup> to 18<sup>th</sup> October.
